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For this thesis, some of the most useful books have been those standard reference works which, by their nature, are unlikely to be cited: it is only fair that special mention should be made of them here. It is impossible to work in a medieval field without Sir Maurice Powicke's *Handbook of British Chronology* (London, 1939: 2nd edition by Powicke and E.B. Fryde, London, 1961) and C.R. Cheney's *Handbook of dates* (London, 1945). Of the various dictionaries, the *Medieval Latin Word-List* (London, 1934) and the larger *Revised Medieval Latin Word-List* which supersedes it (prepared by R.E. Latham : London, 1965) have been indispensable. Two other publications helped greatly, in completely different ways, in the task of understanding medieval life and thought: they are Donald Attwater's *Penguin Dictionary of Saints* (London, 1965) and the Ordnance Survey's *Map of Monastic Britain* (south sheet, 1954: north sheet, 1955).

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
